

ST. LOUIS COUNTY OPIOID REMEDIATION SETTLEMENT FUNDS BLUEPRINT



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LITIGATION & SETTLEMENT

Approximately **3,000 lawsuits** were brought against opioid manufacturers, distributors, retail pharmacy chains, and even marketing consulting firms for their role in the damages caused by the opioid overdose epidemic and opioid addiction crisis. Due to the sheer volume of lawsuits, many cases were consolidated into multidistrict litigation (MDL) in order to more efficiently manage proceedings. As a result, **\$568 million** was directed to Minnesota.

In December 2021, the Minnesota Attorney General's Office reached an agreement with Minnesota cities and counties that determined the allocation of the settlement funds to be 75% to counties and cities and 25% to the State. All 87 counties and all eligible cities within Minnesota will receive settlement payments so long as they joined the settlement through the State of Minnesota Attorney General's Office. Fund distribution was established through a <u>Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)</u>. **St. Louis County stands to receive approximately \$18 million over the next 18 years.** The cities of Duluth and Proctor will also receive settlement funds.

The settlement isn't meant to compensate individuals who have suffered opioidrelated harm, it's meant to provide funding to state, local, and tribal governments to be used to combat the opioid crisis, including detailed programs and strategies focused on:

- Treatment including support for those in treatment, connections to care, addressing needs of criminal justice-involved persons, and addressing needs of perinatal, caregivers, and families.
- **Prevention** including appropriate prescribing, preventing misuse, and harm reduction.
- Other elements including opioid-related first responder expenditures,
 planning and coordination, training, research, and post-mortem expenses.

HISTORY OF OPIOIDS IN ST. LOUIS COUNTY, MN

Opioids have a staggering impact on people in St. Louis County:

- Between 2018 and 2022, calls to 911 for opioid involved overdoses increased by 225% (151 calls in 2018 and 492 calls in 2022).
- Between 2011 and 2021, fatal drug overdoses involving synthetic opioids increased by 1,260% (from 5% in 2011 to 68% in 2021).
- Between 2017-2022, 67% of out-of-home placements county-wide involved drug use in the household.
- 45% of substantiated maltreatment county-wide involved drug use in the household.
- There continues to be an increase in cases of hepatitis C and other injectiondrug related infection rates.
- Substance misuse prevention continues to be reflected in the County's **Community Health Needs Assessment**.

Snapshot of History of Work Throughout the Community:

- Opioid Abuse Response Strategies (OARS) committee work long standing history of building bridges between sectors and needs
- Several community coalitions from across the County continue to work diligently across sectors to positively impact the community's health:

- Several community organizations work daily in a person-centered approach to meet individuals and families where they are and to positively impact the community
- Support from legislators, including Representative Olson and Representative Baker co-authoring a bill establishing the Opioid Epidemic Response Advisory Council and other opiate related legislation

SUMMARY

2021

The Minnesota Attorney General convened an Advisory Panel to solicit feedback from state, county, and city public health experts, members of the State's Opioid Epidemic Response Advisory Council (OERAC), and community service providers on how best to distribute opioid settlement money throughout Minnesota. This panel created a Memorandum of Agreement.

- Linnea Mirsch, St. Louis County Public Health & Human Services Director, was appointed to serve on the the advisory panel.
- Minnesota Memorandum of Agreement established Public Health as Chief Strategist

2022

The St. Louis County Board of Commissioners put out a call for advisory committee members. 21 individuals applied and were appointed to the committee. Additionally, the County Board Chair appointed three County Commissioners, the Public Health & Human Services Director, the Sheriff, and the County Attorney to the committee.

- The advisory committee was established to make recommendations for prioritization of settlement funds for long-term impact.
- The committee met six times in 2022.
- Highlights of the committee work:
 - Evaluated current work happening within the county.
 - Reviewed local data trends and needs.
 - Developed a Community Needs Survey which was distributed to community partners across public safety, public health, social services, healthcare, behavioral health, and persons with lived experience.
 - Identified next steps and strategies based off survey results.
 - Developed and issued a Request for Proposal focusing on:
 - Enriched Broad Prevention Youth
 - Enriched Broad Prevention Community Stigma Reduction
 - Harm Reduction
 - Reviewed and scored RFP applications.

2023

- Provided recommendations to the St. Louis County Board of Commissioners on proposals to fund based off funding eligibility and priority needs.
- 8 proposals were approved for funding.
- Contracts were executed and work began in March 2023.

2023 & Beyond

- Create a county-wide communication plan focused on prevention education, community stigma reduction, and harm reduction education.
- Work with Sheriff's Office, including county jail, to identify needs of justiceinvolved individuals.
- Hold quarterly advisory committee meeting to assess impacts and adjust use of funding as needed.

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and a County Board initiated request for an advisory committee. A <u>call</u> was put out for community experts with professional and lived experience to join the **Opioid Remediation Settlement Advisory Committee**. Along with the 21 community applicants <u>approved by the</u> <u>County Board</u>, the following county officials were also added:

- + 3 County Commissioners
- Director of Public Health & Human Services
- + County Attorney
- County Sheriff

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The Committee met monthly to review <u>State</u> and <u>local</u> data regarding the state of the opioid epidemic within the County

administered <u>a survey</u> to guide prioritization. Survey results were refined by committee members and <u>priorities</u> were set.

An initial <u>Request for</u> <u>Proposals (RFP)</u> was posted and shared through collaboratives and community partners.

All proposals were reviewed by a subset of volunteers from the committee and scored using a <u>score card</u>. Scored proposals were presented to the Committee and proposed action was presented to the County Board.

Round One of funding was <u>approved by</u> <u>the County</u> <u>Board.</u>

Committee meetings are held quarterly to review progress and plan for future years of fund use.



COMMUNITY SURVEY

Through using the framework from the <u>Colorado Health Institute</u>, the advisory committee developed and distributed a survey (<u>see Appendix 3</u>) to community members with professional and lived experience. The survey asked respondents to determine **how they would allocate a hypothetical \$100 million to address the opioid crisis**. This survey was conducted electronically using the online survey tool Survey123 (ArcGIS).

Survey Categories

Harm Reduction, Treatment & Recovery, Prevention, and Criminal Justice. Detailed descriptions of each strategy are included in the survey in <u>Appendix 3</u>.

The advisory committee reviewed the community survey responses, worked through additional prioritization of the survey results based off work and lived experience, and established priority strategies reflected on the next page.


FUNDING ALLOCATION BASED OFF SURVEY RESULTS

RFP Review

Applications were scored based on their ability to address the priorities, the details of their plans, their ability to demonstrate innovation, their ability to measure impact, and their geographical location using a scoring matrix (see <u>Appendix 5</u>).

Follow Up Interviews

Once proposals were selected to move forward in the process, follow up interviews were conducted. Questions were geared specifically toward each proposal and responses were brought back to the review team to aid in making informed decisions.

County recruits community experts to serve on advisory committee regarding use of opioid lawsuit settlement funds

As a result of the national settlement of a class action lawsuit involving several prescription opioid manufacturers and distributors, the state of Minnesota is estimated to receive \$300 million over the next 18 years; and of that, St. Louis County will be receiving the fifth largest local share. To determine how to prioritize use of these funds for most meaningful long-term impact, the County is establishing an advisory committee and is seeking community expert involvement.

Ideal candidates from the public include those with professional and/or lived experience relating to opioids including physicians, pharmacists, families impacted by the opioid epidemic, organizations working in peer support and prevention efforts and the provider community. The Opioid Remediation Advisory Committee also includes appointees from the County Board, as well as staff from Public Health and Human Services, the Sheriff's Office and County Attorney's Office.

The advisory committee will be asked to offer guidance on use of the settlement funds across broad categories including prevention, criminal justice, treatment and recovery, and harm reduction.

The exact amount the County will receive is still being finalized. Under the terms of the settlement, 25% of funds designated for the State of Minnesota will be used by the state, and 75% will be distributed to counties and cities within Minnesota.

"While this will be a significant amount of money for the county, we also know it covers just a fraction of the costs incurred and the damage caused," said County Board Chair Paul McDonald, who called for the creation of the Opioid Remediation Subcommittee at the first Board meeting of 2022. "We need to be strategic in determining how best to invest these funds to help people and communities that have been so devastated by opioids."



3. <u>Proposal Description:</u>

3.1 Geographic area to be served:

Any area within St. Louis County; St. Louis County Opioid Remediation Subcommittee asks that proposals take into consideration the communities and race/ethnicity most-at risk and/or impacted by Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and any co-occurring substance use disorder/Mental Health (SUD/MH) conditions.

3.2 **Purpose/Statement of Need:**

Background: In the summer of 2021, national settlements were reached with opioid distributors McKesson, Cardinal Health, and AmerisourceBergen and opioid manufacturer Johnson & Johnson. Under the settlements, the distributors will pay up to \$21 billion over eighteen years, and Johnson & Johnson will pay up to \$5 billion over up to nine years. Minnesota's share of the total amount depends in large part on the degree to which Minnesota counties and cities choose to participate in the settlements. According to the Minnesota Attorney General's Office, Minnesota's maximum share of the total amount is over \$300 million. St. Louis County will receive the 5th largest settlement over the 18-year period, approximately \$11.2 million. In January 2022, the St. Louis County Board Chair called for the Opioid Remediation Settlement Funds Subcommittee to be created, appointed 3 commissioners as well as the Sheriff, County Attorney and Public Health and Human Services (PHHS) Director. The Board Chair also requested a

call for applicants to serve on this expert panel in which 21 community members responded, representing Law Enforcement, Medical Community, Providers, Harm Reduction, Peer Recovery and families and individuals directly impacted by the opioid use crisis.

The Opioid Remediation Subcommittee: The purpose of the Opioid Remediation Subcommittee is to make recommendations on the distribution of opioid settlement funds and it is intended to support positive long-term impacts in the areas of prevention and harm reduction. The focus of this subcommittee is to provide funding recommendations to the County Board.

Through an intersection across broad stakeholder input, subcommittee member input, County Board input and best practices, the Opioid Remediation Subcommittee came up with three initial priorities to recommend to the board for an initial distribution of settlement funds.

These initial priorities for this RFP follow the Johns Hopkins Principles for Local Government and will focus on prevention and expanding harm reduction programs. Further description and examples of priority work can be found in the documents linked under resources in section 3.3. Subsequent year awards will incorporate other priorities, including a focus on the justice-involved population and the transition from jail.

The priorities include:

 Enriched, broad prevention strategies, focusing on youth programs that are trauma informed, culturally sensitive and equitable approach
 Broad community stigma reduction community-based education for communities, families, and youth

3) **Harm reduction** – syringe exchanges, overdose prevention, peer recovery supports and services.

To directly address these issues, the Opioid remediation Subcommittee is inviting community-based organizations within St. Louis County and internal St. Louis County departments to submit proposals for 1 year of funding (March 1, 2023 – February 29, 2024) that address the above priorities within St. Louis County. These projects or initiatives can build on existing programs but need to demonstrate how they will specifically address one of the identified priorities. Initial funding will be awarded to a limited number of organizations to allow for a targeted and impactful response. The first year is considered base year funding with the intent that future funding may be available for those projects that are able to show quantifiable results and impact in the initial funding year. These funds

cannot be used to supplant current funding that an organization has already received.

3.3 Services/Resources to be Developed:

The Opioid Remediation Subcommittee is requesting proposals that target populations in communities throughout St. Louis County that have been most impacted by substance use disorder and the opioid epidemic. Each proposal does not need to propose to serve all of St. Louis County but needs to (1) clearly identify why the organization is positioned to successfully implement the proposal for a specific community or geographic area; (2) detailed background of the evidence-based or practice-informed program or practice being proposed.
